PROJECTS, EVENTS, & PARTNERSHIPS.

COLLECTION REVIEW 2021-2022

As part of our ongoing work to offer transparency to LGBTQ2+ communities about what is and is not a part of our collection, The ArQuives commissioned a report detailing the contents of our library, archives, artifact, and reference collections.

The Collection Review took place from 2021 to 2022 with the support of Inclusive Voices, who worked with archivists to evaluate a sample (7%) of the collection to look for trends that speak to who is or is not represented.

The report, researched and written by Inclusive Voices, outlines recommendations and opportunities for The ArQuives, considers past and current collecting practices and incorporates feedback, thoughts, and ideas from the voices of volunteers, staff, community organizations, and archivists across Canada.

The Collection Development Plan has been created as a part of an ongoing process to make our collections more accessible to the the public and offer transparency around our professional practices.


This work has included a significant redescription project for all archival collections to bring them to professional Canadian archival standards, a large cataloging project to describe artifact and artwork collections, making our collections accessible to the public via our Online Collections Portal, and a Collections Review Project that reviewed our collecting practices by assessing our existing holdings.

including supporting staff and
volunteers working with the
collection and creating a
transparent document to guide The
ArQuives' decision- making process
so that we are accountable to

ourselves, our Strategic Plan, and our community. The ArQuives holds an amazing collection of material, and The Collection Development Plan aims to actively work at making it more representative and accessible to the community.

This plan will be supported by annual budget allocation for processing collections and making descriptions accessible online, partnerships, and yearly programming, including exhibitions, events, tours, and educational programming.

Salaam Canada Oral History Partnership

Throughout 2021-2022 The ArQuives, in partnership with Salaam Canada, worked with volunteer Golshan Golriz to conduct outreach to LGBTQ+ Muslims across Canada to increase our exposure and LGBTQ+ Muslim materials in The ArQuives. This partnership extended to The ArQuives hiring Khadijah Kanji to research and write a history of Salaam in celebration of their 30th anniversary. Through hours of oral histories conducted by Khadijah,

she compiled an incredible history of Salaam. The ArQuives is currently working to create an online exhibition to showcase these materials and to highlight the vital work of Salaam for the LGBTQ+ Muslim community in Canada.

Community Webs Web Archiving project

In the summer of 2021, The ArQuives successfully applied to join the Community Webs program run by the Internet Archives. This program works to provide cultural heritage institutions resources to collect web-published materials to document their local communities. The ArQuives started to build our epository of web archiving throughout 2021, which will continue. Web Archiving is a new collecting

territory for most archives, especially community archives like us. Still, we are thankful for the assistance of Board Member and Digital Archivist Renee Saucier, who has been a fountain of knowledge and support.

Magenta

In 2020, The Magenta Foundation approached The ArQuives to partner on an exhibit and book, Joy. Sorrow. Anger. Love. Pride, celebrating Pride in Toronto from 1970 to today through the lens of The ArQuives for our 50th Anniversary. The arts-publishing house worked with up-and-coming curators to research and develop a book, and worked with the community to engage in a collecting project, showcasing photos that are yet to be added to The ArQuives.



Sex Salon: Talking Sex: Engaging with the Pussy **Palace Oral Histories**

On September 15, 2000, five Toronto police officers raided the Pussy Palace, an exclusive bathhouse event for queer women and trans folk, laying several charges against the organizers, accusing them of violating liquor laws. There has never been an oral history project about this event, the last police raid of a queer bathhouse in Canadian history.

The LGBTQ Oral History Digital Collaboratory, in collaboration with The ArQuives, has collected 36 interviews with bathhouse patrons, event organizers, and community activists. The interviews address not only the raid, but also radical sex/gender cultures at the turn of the 21st century in Toronto. A 6-member team has been working to animate and activate these interviews through research creation in the form of audio portraits, video shorts, and other methods.



Compelling, often hilarious and always rebellious, the women interviewed in this film recount stories about their search for the places where openly gay women gathered in urban centres.

Contemporary interviews, archival footage and a stylized fictional narrative based on the pulp novels of the 1950s are woven throughout this simultaneously funny, heartbreaking and empowering film. Forbidden Love brings an important and empowering history of lesbian sexuality in Canada out of the closet.

A post-screening Q&A with director and Hot Docs alum Lynne Fernie was moderated by filmmaker Janis Cole.

The exhibit featured portraits of LGBTQ2+ Canadians in the celebration of Pride Month and highlighted important contributions of the LGBTQ2+ Canadians and their role in the wider community.

25 portraits were featured in the museum from June until September 2022. The collection showcased a variety of different media, with each portrait including a biography and a description of how this individual contributed to the LGBTQ2+ community in Canada.


The AIDS Walk Toronto Virtual Museum

WHERE: (ONLINE)

In 1982, Canada had its first reported case of AIDS and AIDS Committee of Toronto was formed the following year. The AIDS Walk Toronto—which began as *From All Walks of Life*, a name it held until 1996—ran annually in downtown Toronto.

Teams comprised of community organizations, small businesses, schools, chosen families, and other small groups collected pledges together leading up to the walk. AIDS Walk Toronto had its final walk in 2020.

The Virtual Exhibition commemorates the history of this important fundraiser and annual community event.

2SLGBTQIA+ Stories: An Adaptable Mini-Unit Plan for English or History Classrooms was first developed and piloted by The ArQuives in 2021 to support educators in incorporating queer and trans perspectives into Grade 9-12 English and History curricula.


We understand that many teachers feel unsure about including 2SLGBTQIA+ topics in their lesson plans because they don't think they know enough about queerness and transness and are worried will do the work "wrong." Others aren't sure how to address negative responses from colleagues, parents/caregivers, or community members.

To attend to these issues, we have developed two companion resources: Become 2SLGBTQIA+ Literate and 2SLGBTQIA+ School Advocacy: A Policy Resource.

Become 2SLGBTQIA+ Literate is an accessible introduction to queer and trans histories in Canada, with a focus on (educational) activism.

2SLGBTQIA+ School Advocacy is an introduction to understanding and implementing policies on sexual orientation, gender identity, and gender expression in Canadian schools.

Launched in 2022 and now available on our website, these resources will help teachers have direct access to lessons and activities with primary source materials to support learning.



WORKING HOURS


Despite the pandemic and our closure we still had a tremendous amount of volunteer support throughout the year.

FINANCIAL OUTLOOK.

FINANCIAL OUTLOOK

The financial results of The ArQuives for 2022 showed a small deficit for the year of -\$17,609 compared to a surplus of \$210,442 in the previous year. These results were largely driven by a challenging year in the investment portfolio which had the effect of obscuring a healthy operating surplus driven by strong fundraising revenues.

We are pleased to report a net operating surplus in 2022 of \$109,300, compared to \$13,709 in 2021. Total revenues from operations were significantly higher in 2022 as a result of strong fundraising results. Revenues from individual private sector donors increased year or year by 45% as several major donors contributed multi-year gifts. In addition, grant revenues were significantly higher year over year. Earned revenue from fees, store sales and other programming was lower year over year.



FINANCIAL OUTLOOK

Expenses from operations were generally higher in 2022 as the organization began to return to more normal post-pandemic operations and programming. This increase in expenses was driven to a large degree by higher salaries and wages, as well as higher administrative costs.

Our financial statements report certain non-operating revenues and expenses separately. In 2022, negative investment results were the main driver behind a net other income loss of \$126,909. Net income from our investment portfolio can result in large swings year over year, and 2022 was no exception with net investment results for 2022 being down \$123,874, compared to being up \$146,444 in 2021. In summary, the 2022 financial results can be seen in a positive light despite the impact of turbulent financial markets on our investment portfolio.
